## Simple, Compound, Complex Sentences

A simple sentence has just one subject and one predicate. The dog barked at me is an example. The subject is "the dog" and the predicate is "barked at me".

A compound sentence will have a word like "and" which combines to thoughts, are "but" which contrasts to thoughts. If you took the two sentences apart by removing the "and" or the "but", you will have two sentences.

A complex sentence has a simple sentence with another phrase, separated from the simple sentence with a comma. If you look at the part of the sentence that is not the simple sentence, it would **NOT** be a sentence on its own.


