- 3. Leaving the yellow sheet all in one piece, take each of the definition cards and place it on top of the idiom that represents this definition.

Idioms are groups of words which mean something that can't be understood by just reading the words. For example, an idiom is "It's raining cats and dogs." Obviously, rain is NOT cats and dogs. What this idiom means is that it is really raining hard. Another example would be an invitation to a party which asks you to "Bring a White Elephant." Needless to say, no one wants a real elephant, gray or white, at a party. This idiom means to bring a gift that no one would really want, a prank gift.

Understanding what idioms mean is an important part of being able to read some books.
